- Consider changing the attendance policy feel like a lot of people took advantage of the fact that attendance was only taken through pop quizzes and there were like maybe 6 through the semester. its a nice gesture, but I think it would be in future students interest to have to be in class. Other than that, I feel like this should be a 4000 level class considering how in-depth this course is. Lucky that I was able to take it as a 3000 level class. Overall, a good class!
- · Guided readings would be very helpful to know which concepts are important or things that should be examined further in readings.
- · I would say that the assigned reading were a little dense and long at times and going through each reading during class could be a little redundant.
- The professor tailored this course to reflect his field of study, which was not a part of the course I signed up for and sometimes did not connect to ideas of State and Local government. This took away from the engagement of the course and was very limited in its connection to the course material. This took away from the overall learning objectives and made the lectures hard to follow. I would suggest the professor makes a separate course that deals with energy policy instead of forcing it into the State and Local class. In addition to this the book that was assigned to read at the end of the course was very repetitive and unengaging. I did not find reading the book to benefit my learning of the course material nor the shift of the class to revolve around to book. I suggest having students read excerpts of the book or other readings like at the beginning of the course.
